



## General Delegates Meeting Orlando, FL – Dec 13, 2024

#### **Dennis Sprung:**

New clubs announced for AKC membership: American Hairless Terrier Club Of America and Greeley Kennel Club. Delegate vote in favor of approval.

New Delegates were introduced and bios read in by the Secretary.

Moment of silence for deceased Delegates.

Secretary read-in Nominating Committee report of Nominees for the AKC Board. Nominees presented their statements.

#### Chairman's Report:

- This year's entries are as impressive as ever, with well over 8000 entries across Conformation and more than 1200 entries in Companion Events combined.
- AKC registrations have seen a notable decline from the peaks we experienced during the COVID-19 pandemic. Specifically, individual dog registrations are down by 14 percent from last year, and litter registrations have decreased by 17 percent. In fact, the number of litter registrations in 2024 has now fallen below the levels we witnessed in 2018.
- Our Marketing Department has engaged an agency that made a new branding campaign to encourage the public to register their dogs.
   The campaign will consist of a television commercial and social

media advertisements that showcase purebred dogs, responsible dog ownership and breeding. It highlights AKC's authority, and history yet positions our organization as approachable and friendly. When tested among our target audience, 18to 44-year-olds, 37 percent said they were extremely likely to register their next purebred dog after being exposed to the campaign. You will see the new AKC commercial when you watch the broadcast of the AKC National Championship on December 29, 2024 on ABC television from 2-5 p.m. ET. The campaign will be rolled out in full this coming February.

• The AKC Registration and Information Technology teams are also working to improve online registration application processes. We have a new, simplified Online Litter Registration system. Now, litters conceived by artificial insemination can be registered online. The Online Litter system is now fully integrated with the Breeder Toolkit, which makes it easier for breeders to select dogs and track progeny. The new system is also linked with Prepaid Dog Registration, which helps Breeders of Merit comply with their commitment to register all dogs in a litter. Look





out for planned improvements to the Online Dog Registration system in the first quarter of 2025 as well. Be assured that your Board and Staff are firmly committed to addressing and responding to trends that threaten our fancy and our sports. But we cannot do it alone. Upholding and advancing our registry are our mission and our shared responsibility. Your support, dedication, and action are crucial. We must all encourage our own puppy buyers to register their dogs. Whether a puppy is eligible for full or limited registration application, please make sure new owners know why registering is important.

 The Chairman extends his thanks to the AKC staff and Board for all their hard work in helping to keep the AKC moving forward with new initiatives.

## A DOG DISEASE PEOPLE CATCH

A new disease has been identified. probably caused by a virus among dog owning people. It apparently has been in existence for a considerable time but only recently has anyone identified this disease, and begun to study it. It is called the Acquired Canine Obsessive Syndrome (ACOS). At first ACOS was originally considered to be psychological in nature, but after two young researchers suddenly decided to become show breeders, it became evident that it was an infectious agent. Epidemiologists have identified three stages of this disease. Read about the symptoms to see if you have fallen victim to ACOS.

#### Stage I (Early Symptoms)

- 1. You think that any show within 300 miles is near by.
- 2. You begin to enjoy getting up at 5 a.m. in the morning to walk and feed dogs.
- 3. You think it's fun to spend several hours a day grooming dogs

- 4. You think you're being frugal if you spend less than \$3,000 dollars a year on shows.
- 5. You can't remember what it was like to have just one dog.

#### Stage II (Definitely Infected)

- 1. When choosing a new car the most important factor is how many crates you can fit in it.
- When you look for a house, the first thing you think of is how many dogs you can kennel on the property.
- 3. Your dog food bill is higher than your family's.
- 4. You spend as much on veterinarians as on doctors.
- 5. You have no money because of showing dogs.
- You have to buy more than one vehicle a year because you keep burning out the 7 year or 70,000 mile warranty going to shows.

- 7. You have more pictures of the dogs than of your family.
- 8. Your idea of a fun vacation is to hit a long show circuit.
- 9. Most of your conversations revolve around the dogs.

#### Stage III (Terminal Stage)

- You wake up in the morning and find out that you put the kids in the crates and the dogs in the beds last night.
- You know each dog's name and pedigree, but can't figure out who that stranger in the house is; it turns out to be your husband/wife/boyfriend/ girlfriend.
- 3. Your neighbors keep insisting that those kids running around your house bothering the dogs are yours.
- 4. You keep telling the kids to "heel" and can't understand why they won't and why they keep objecting to the choke chain.
- 5. You cash in the kid's college trust fund to campaign the dogs.
- 6. You've been on the road showing dogs so long that you can't remember where you live.
- 7. Your family tells you "It's either the dogs or us," you choose the dogs.

Do you have this dreaded disease? Well, there is hope. Researchers have found that most cases seem to stop at Stage II and remain chronic.

Currently several Stage III ACOS patients have been confined to isolation wards where they are being studied to gain a better understanding of this disease. It is a sad sight to see formerly vibrant people as they shuffle around their rooms in endless triangle or L-patterns, making odd hand motions (as if holding a lead and

baiting a dog), and making chirping noises. Merely saying the word "Westminster" can send them into an uncontrollable frenzy. Unfortunately, there isn't much hope for these cases, but with time and research to further understand this disease, there may be hope to come up with a cure.

Attempts are being made to isolate the causative agent in the hopes of being able to develop a vaccine in the future. An interesting sidelight of this disease seems to be that exposure at an early age has an immunizing effect. Several people afflicted with ACOS at State II and Stage III have close family members (children, husbands, wives) who have absolutely no disease. It is thought by some researchers that this may be due to environmental effects to an agerelated immune function or to the fact that those at these stages of the disease tend not to associate with their close family members possibly due to the memory deficit induced by the disease, that is, in that they don't remember that they have close family members?

What can be done to prevent this disease? Until a cure is found. prevention is the measure. Avoid kennels advertising "show stock," since it may be that dogs are carriers of the disease. Leave town on those days that the local newspapers inform you of a show in the area. If you inadvertently come into contact with an ACOS afflicted person, leave as soon as possible (they do tend to cling), and thoroughly shower, preferably with germicidal soap. If you are living with an ACOS afflicted person, take comfort that, if you haven't succumbed yet, you are probably safe.

## In Memory of Katie Winters

Winters Miniature Pinschers

The miniature pinscher breed has lost an avid breeder and successful exhibitor, Katie Winters, who contributed greatly to the breed, keeping it at the forefront of conformation competition with passion, dedication and support.

Katie established Winters min pins in the early 1990's after a successful life in horses and whippets. She bred numerous champions in her California home and acquired and/or co-owned/ co-bred many fine specimens that were campaigned by a number of handlers over the years. Of special pride was her homebred Ch Winters the Red Pony who was campaigned for Katie throughout his career and top rankings primarily by well-known min pin breeder/handler Pam Campbell. Red (his call name) won the MPCA National Specialty twice, in 2000 and 2002, and as a puppy won the Sweepstakes in 1999. He also was a

Westminster Breed Winner and Eukanuba (now Royal Canin) Breed winner as well.

In Katie's 30+ years of involvement with min pins, she always campaigned a Special and was always very competitive and successful with her dogs. There were various other handlers throughout the years who piloted her dogs to top rankings in the Breed, such as Merlyn Green and Jacob & Luke Waters. In recent years, her partnership with Jacob Waters handling, and co-breeding and/or co-owning her Specials with friends, proved to be a winning combination. Of note were the 3 last min pins she campaigned, handled by the Waters who were like family to Katie; GCHP Eagle's The Wolverine who won an allbreed Best In Show for Katie (and Sue Griswold), her first, and was #1 min pin in Breed Points 2020.


Followed by GCHG Winers-Eagle Ring of Fire who also won all-breed Bests In Show and was ranked #l in Breed Points in 2022. Katie passed away during the campaign of her latest special, the bitch GCHG Lil Barker's Eeeveee Chloe (Bred/coowned with the Diaz and Aldeguer family) who is ranked #l for 2024 in Breed Points. All of them were also in the Top 5 rankings of All-Breed point systems while campaigned.



## Madeline Miller

It is with a heavy heart I share that my mom, Madeline Miller, died on Tuesday, October 22 at age 82. However, it is also with great pride that I write this article celebrating her life and accomplishments, especially her work with the MPCA and the Min Pin breed.

My mom was born in 1942 in Detroit, Michigan, and was a graduate of Cass Tech High School, also in Detroit. She attended Michigan State University in the 1960s and eventually became a cytologist, a career she held for almost three decades. In 1999, she transitioned to a tax preparer role with H&R Block, and eventually became a Senior Tax Analyst, a role she held until her retirement in 2019.

What truly set my mom apart and forged her legacy were her contributions to the Min Pin breed, and dog show world overall, that spanned several decades. She started as a breeder and exhibitor of Dobermans in 1969, and she got her first Min Pin in 1974. At the time, she thought it nothing more than a "fun diversion," but what started as a fun diversion turned in to over four decades of work with the breed, and her accomplishments as a breeder, exhibitor, judge, and educator were extraordinary.

She was a Lifetime Member of the MPCA, which she joined in 1977. She later became the Club's Awards Chair in 1987, a post she held for over 23 years. She eventually became Judge's Education Coordinator and Judge's Education Committee Chair of the Club in the mid-2000's. She served on the Board of Directors for four years in the mid-1990's, and she was also

recognized by the Club as an official and long-time Min Pin mentor. The Club has recognized her with multiple awards over the years, including the Good Guy Award in 2007, and the Dog World Award in 2015. She was also a founding member and longtime Secretary of the Motor City Miniature Pinscher Club. I know she was most proud of judging assignments at the MPCA Nationals in 2003 and in Indonesia in 2006, her years of work in judge's education with the MPCA, and her efforts over three decades with the Motor City Miniature Pinscher Club.

Her first foray into breeding Min Pins under the Madric kennel was in 1976. After that, she owned or bred 75 champion Min Pins in three countries, including an all-breed Best in Show winner, several Group winners, and two Westminster Breed winners. She produced an MPCA Hall of Fame Sire, CH Fillpin's Madric Lucas, as well as another MPCA Honor Roll Sire and two MPCA Honor Roll Dams. Those

dogs produced multiple champion offspring in the 1980's and 1990's whose lineages likely continue to this day. She started judging AKC sanctioned shows in 1996 with approval for Min Pins and Junior Showmanship. She eventually was approved to judge Best in Show, Toy Group, Doberman Pinschers, Rhodesian Ridgebacks, Boxers, and 12 other breeds. She judged her final show in 2021. During her 25 years of active judging, she judged the MPCA National Specialty, multiple regional breed specialties, and other judging assignments in three countries and over 20 states.

My mom put an exclamation point on her over four decades' involvement with Min Pins through her extensive work in judge's education. After becoming the MPCA Judge's Education Chair, she regularly led annual seminars at the MPCA National Specialties, seminars hosted through other









Clubs, and wrote articles on judging the Min Pin, including "Evaluating the Miniature Pinscher," as well as several pamphlets. She was also a member of the American Dog Show Judges, and she regularly lent her knowledge and wisdom of both the Min Pin and other breeds to many other aspiring and thencurrent judges.

She had a zeal for life and numerous interests outside Min Pins and the dog world. She was a volunteer usher, and later Team Leader, at the Fox Theater in Detroit for many years, she took a keen interest in decorative gardening, live theater, and collecting and trying recipes. She also loved sports, and in particular the Michigan State Spartans and Detroit Tigers, Lions, Pistons, and Red Wings. She made sure to have a Detroit or Michigan State Spartans game on the TV when one was on. She

always looked forward to our annual pilgrimages to Hy's Cider Mill in the fall, and to one of the local casinos on Christmas Eve for a buffet dinner and slot machines, a tradition we started over 25 years ago and one I intend to continue, even though she won't physically be with me.

Not only did she have a love for the Min Pin and dogs in general, she also had a love for all animals. She would regularly check in on her "grand cats" that I've had over the years, and I remember at several times she took in animals that weren't dogs in need of rescue. Those animals? Cats and an Iguana. Though she became less active with Min Pins in her later years, she never lost that love of animals. She left behind a German Pinscher rescue, Floyd, and three cats.



Those that knew my mother will remember her as a vivacious spitfire who was never afraid to speak her mind. You always knew how she felt about certain topics – like, say, the University of Michigan Wolverines or Dallas Cowboys. But she also had a wealth of knowledge on the Min Pin, as well as numerous other breeds, which she shared actively and readily.

I remember one story from years ago and something I discovered as I was preparing this article that perfectly summed up who my mom was – Once, she was out running an errand on a hot summer day and she saw a panting dog locked in a parked car. Most people would have kept on their way or maybe just called the police. Unconcerned with what kind of person may have been responsible, and possibly putting her own safety at risk, she waited right

there for a half hour to confront the person and "tell them how much of an a\*\*hole they are." Another time, she took time to send a scathing letter to the editor email to Dog World magazine tearing into an author that incorrectly categorized the Min Pin's hackney gait. Her explanation in the email of why she believed that author was wrong was so clear and well-presented that even I learned something from reading it. This is who my mom was - passionate, and not afraid to speak her mind or share her knowledge.

I am grateful to share this story of the impact my mom had on both the Min Pin breed and the people she touched along the way. She mentored countless exhibitors and judges on the finer points of the breed, and her guidance touched newcomers and veterans alike. Her tireless work, mentorship, and leadership left a positive and lasting impact on the breed. She will be missed by many, but her impact will never be forgotten.







# Why Puppy Socialization Matters

#### Surfaces

Letting your puppy explore different surfaces helps them get used to all the different textures and feels under their paws. This is a big deal for building their confidence when walking on new surfaces. Here are some surfaces to try out:

- Grass: Let them romp around in grassy areas so they can check out the texture and sniff out all sorts of scents.
- Concrete and Asphalt: Walks on sidewalks and driveways are key for city pups so they can learn how to navigate around people safely.
   Remember, check the surface temperature in the summer!
- Carpet and Tile: Getting them used to common indoor surfaces helps prevent any fear when they're inside the house.
- Wood and Laminate: These can be slippery, so it's good for pups to learn how to walk on them without feeling nervous.

Getting your puppy socialized is extremely important for teaching them how to relax and interact comfortably with the world around them. The best time for this is between three weeks and three months old when they're soaking up new experiences like a sponge. The best method for this is associating new and/or unfamiliar situations with something positive. Good socialization means getting your puppy used to different surfaces, sounds, people, objects, and other animals, which helps them grow into comfortable and confident adult dogs.

 Sand: Trips to the beach or a sandbox get them used to the squishy feel of sand, making them more adaptable overall.

#### Sounds

New sounds can startle or frighten puppies, so it's a good idea to introduce them gradually. Getting your puppy used to different sounds can help prevent noise anxiety and keep them calm in loud places. Here's a list of sounds to include in their socialization:

- Household Noises: Introduce them to everyday sounds like vacuum cleaners, doorbells, and washing machines.
- Outdoor Noises: Let them hear traffic, sirens, and construction noises in a controlled way so they stay calm outside.
- Nature Sounds: Make sure they hear birds, rain, thunder, and wind to avoid scaring them during walks or outdoor fun.
- Kids: Kids can be loud and chaotic, so getting your pup used to their shouts and laughter will help them stay calm around children.
- Other Animals: Puppies will encounter barking dogs, meowing cats, and chirping birds. A positive introduction will help them stay cool in animal-heavy areas.
- Show venue sounds: Record the sounds in a grooming area and around the rings.

Rewarding a calm puppy while you introduce sounds helps them associate the noises with something positive.

Start with sounds at a low volume, gradually increasing the volume. Keep sessions short. If your puppy is overwhelmed move it farther away from the source of the sound.

#### Handling

Getting your pup used to being handled is critical for their comfort and confidence. It is also important as it reduces stress during grooming, veterinarian visits, judge exams, and interacting with people. Here's what to focus on:

- Touching Paws: Gently rub, never squeeze, their paws so they're ready for nail trims and paw checks.
- Checking Ears and Mouth: Regularly look at their ears and mouth to help them get used to vet checks, teeth brushing, and grooming.
- Brushing and Bathing: Introducing grooming tools and bath time early on makes them chill during grooming sessions.
- Lifting and Holding: They should be okay with being lifted and held so they don't panic when it happens.
   While hugging is on the puppy socialization list it is not welcomed by many puppies and may trigger fight or flight.
- Crate Training: Getting them comfy with being in a crate helps them feel secure in tight spaces, allows for safe transport in vehicles and prepares them for crating in hotels, at shows, and at the vet's office. Make their crate comfortable and enjoyable.

#### **People**

Meeting different types of people is a big deal for a puppy's socialization. Having positive interactions helps them grow up well-rounded and less scared. Make sure they meet:

- Men and Women: Meeting both genders helps prevent preferences or fears.
- Kids: Gentle interactions with kids teaches them how to behave around younger humans and keeps them from getting scared or aggressive.
- Seniors: Meeting older folks helps them feel comfy with people of all ages and people with unsteady gaits.
- Diverse Appearances: Introduce them to people with beards, glasses, hats, and different ethnic backgrounds.
- Strangers: Positive and supervised interactions with strangers helps cut down on fear and anxiety around new people. You don't have to let strangers touch or hold your puppy in order for them to be exposed to strangers.

#### Other Animals

Getting your puppy used to other animals is key for making sure they have good relationships and aren't aggressive. Just keep it safe and comfortable for everyone involved. Include:

 Other Dogs: Supervised playdates with friendly pups with similar play styles teaches them how to behave and communicate with other dogs.

- Cats: Introduce them to cats slowly so they can learn to get along with their furry friends.
- Small Animals: Let them see rabbits, hamsters, or birds to help them respect smaller creatures. Remember to consider the intensity of prey drive in your puppy's breed.
- Farm Animals: For country pups, meeting animals like horses, cows, and chickens can help reduce any fear. Keep your puppy close and on a leash for his safety.
- Wildlife: Watching squirrels or birds from a distance teaches them to stay calm.

#### Wrap-Up

Puppy socialization is a major component of raising a confident and well-rounded puppy. It takes commitment, time, and effort. By exposing your pup to all sorts of surfaces, sounds, handling, people, and other animals you are teaching him the world is a safe, positive place and you have his back.

# Fruits and Vegetables Dogs Can or Can't Eat

It's not uncommon to want to spoil your dog by sharing your favorite people food snack instead of a dog treat. After all, if it is safe for you to eat, it must be OK for your dog to eat, right? Not necessarily. While many people foods are perfectly safe for dogs, some are very unhealthy and downright dangerous, so it's critical to learn which fruits and vegetables dogs can eat.

Dogs digest foods differently than humans do, and eating the wrong foods can lead dogs to long-term health problems and, in extreme cases, even death. As omnivores, dogs have no real need for fruits or vegetables as part of their diet, but giving dog-safe fruit or vegetables to dogs as a treat or snack is OK. Fresh dog foods often include vegetables and fruits in diets formulated for dogs because they offer a source of vitamins, minerals, and antioxidants. Read on to find out which fruits and vegetables are OK for sharing in moderation and which should be avoided.

#### Fruits Dogs Can and Can't Eat



#### **Apples**

**Yes**, dogs can eat apples. Apples are an excellent source of vitamins A and C, as well as fiber for your dog. They are low in protein and fat, making them the perfect snack for senior dogs. Just be sure to remove the seeds and core first. Try them frozen for an icy warm weather snack. You can also find it as an ingredient in apple-flavored dog treats.



#### Avocado

**No**, dogs should avoid avocado. While avocado may be a healthy snack for dog owners, it should not be given to dogs. The pit, skin, and leaves of avocados contain persin, a toxin that often causes vomiting and diarrhea in dogs. The fleshy inside of the avocado fruit doesn't have

as much persin as the rest of the plant, but it still can be too much for dogs to handle. Avocado flesh is also high in fat, which can cause gastroinsestinal upset for dogs, or contribute to health conditions like pancreatitis if too much is consumed. Your dog can still enjoy the benefits of avocado if you look for dog treats for skin and coat that include avocado in the ingredients.



#### Bananas

Yes, dogs can eat bananas. In moderation, bananas are a great low-calorie treat for dogs. They're high in potassium, vitamins, biotin, fiber, and copper. They are low in cholesterol and sodium, but because of their high sugar content, bananas should be given as a treat, not part of your dog's main diet. (You can also find banana dog treats that never get overripe!)



#### Blueberries

Yes, dogs can eat blueberries.
Blueberries are a superfood rich in antioxidants, which prevent cell damage in humans and canines alike. They're packed with fiber and phytochemicals as well. Teaching your dog to catch treats in the air? Try blueberries! The powerhouse fruit is a popular ingredient for blueberry dog treats, sometimes in combination with other superfoods like yogurt.



#### **Gantaloupe**

Yes, cantaloupe is safe for dogs. Cantaloupe is packed with nutrients, low in calories, and a great source of water and fiber. It is, however, high in sugar, so should be shared in moderation, especially for dogs who are overweight or have diabetes. Try freezing balls or cubes of cantaloupe for your dog for a refreshing summertime enrichment snack.



#### **Cherries**

No, dogs should not eat cherries. With the exception of the fleshy fruit around the seed, cherry plants contain cyanide and are toxic to dogs. Cyanide disrupts cellular oxygen transport, which means that your dog's blood cells can't get enough oxygen. If you have a cherry tree in your yard, be sure your dog doesn't have free access to fallen fruit. If your dog eats cherries whole or cherry pits, watch for dilated pupils, difficulty breathing, and red gums, as these may be signs of cyanide poisoning, which is a veterinary emergency. If you're enjoying cherries yourself, be sure to secure the discarded pits in a dog-proof

trash can or trash bin that your dog can't access, and let kids know not to share their cherries or cherry pits with your dog. To allow your dog to safely experience the antioxidant benefits that cherries have, choose cherry dog treats formulated for your friend.



#### **Granberries**

Yes, cranberries are safe for dogs to eat. Both cranberries and dried cranberries are safe to feed to dogs in small quantities. Whether your dog will actually like this tart treat is another question. Either way, moderation is important when feeding cranberries to dogs, as with any treat, as too many cranberries can lead to an upset stomach. It's also worth noting that many dried cranberries sold for people to eat are sweetened, so giving them to your dog is adding unneeded sugar to their diet. Instead, if your dog craves the tangy taste of cranberries, opt for unsweetened fresh or frozen fruits, or pick up some crunchy cranberry dog treats.



#### Gucumbers

Yes, dogs can eat cucumbers. Cucumbers are especially good for overweight dogs, as they hold little to no carbohydrates or fat, and they are full of satiating hydration. They're loaded with vitamins K, C, and Bl, as well as potassium, copper, magnesium, and biotin. Cool cucumbers are an excellent hot weather treat if your dog enjoys them, and you can even freeze slices for a fun enrichment snack.



No, dogs should never eat grapes. If you think your dog has eaten grapes, call your veterinarian. Grapes and raisins (dried grapes) have proved to be very toxic for dogs no matter the dog's breed, sex, or age. In fact, grapes are so toxic that they can lead to acute sudden kidney failure. Always be mindful of this dangerous fruit around dogs, especially if you have children who eat grapes or raisins in your home. If you're throwing away grapes or raisins, don't put them in a compost heap your dog has access to, and be sure your trash can is designed to be dog-proof or (for those crafty problem-solving dogs) placed where your dog can't access it.



Yes, dogs can eat mangoes. This sweet and juicy tropical treat is packed with four different vitamins: A, B6, C, and E. Mangoes also have potassium and both beta-carotene and alpha-carotene. Just remember, as with most fruits, remove the hard pit first, as it contains small amounts of cyanide and can become a choking hazard. Mango is high in sugar, so use it as an occasional treat, especially for dogs who struggle with weight. A less messy option for getting the benefits of mango's superfood nutrients is a chewy mango dog treat.



#### **Oranges**

**Yes**, dogs can eat oranges. Oranges are fine for dogs to eat, according to veterinarians, but it's common for dogs to be turned off by any kind of strong citrus smells or tastes. Oranges are an excellent source of vitamin C, potassium, and fiber, and in small quantities, the juicy flesh

of an orange can be a tasty treat for your dog. Vets do recommend tossing the orange peel and only offering your dog the flesh of the orange, minus any seeds. Orange peel is rough on their digestive systems, and the oils may make your dog literally turn up their sensitive nose. If your dog isn't a fan of fresh citrus, there are a few dog treats with orangesto choose from.



#### Peaches

**Yes**, peaches are safe for dogs to eat. Small amounts of cut-up fresh or frozen peaches are a great source of fiber and vitamin A, but just like cherries, the pit contains cyanide. As long as you completely cut the flesh away from the peach pit, then fresh peach flesh can be a great summer treat. Be sure the pits are safely discarded in dog-safe trash receptacles. Skip canned peaches, as they usually contain high amounts of sugary syrups. Even canned or jarred peaches "in natural juice" have more sugar than any dog needs. Frozen peach slices can be a fun, hot-weather enrichment snack for dogs.



#### Pears

Yes, dogs can eat pears. Pears are a great snack because they're high in copper, vitamins C and K, and fiber. If you're sharing pears with your dog, just be sure to cut the pear flesh into bite-size chunks and remove the pit and seeds first, as the seeds contain traces of cyanide. Skip canned or jarred pears with sugary syrups, even the ones labeled "in their own juice." You can also find pear dog treats with other functional ingredients like duck or salmon.



Yes, pineapple is safe for dogs to eat. A few chunks of pineapple are a great sweet treat for dogs, as long as the prickly outside peel and crown are removed first. The tropical fruit is full of vitamins, minerals, and fiber. It also contains bromelain, an enzyme that makes it easier for dogs to absorb proteins. As with other fruits, don't choose canned or packaged pineapple in sweetened syrups, as dogs don't need added sugars in their diets, especially if they're prone to obesity. You can also find pineapple dog treats for a taste of the islands on the go.



#### Pumpkin

**Yes**, pure pumpkin is a healthy food for dogs. Pumpkin is full of antioxidants, but its superpower is that it works to relieve both diarrhea and constipation in dogs. If you're buying canned pumpkin, always choose 100% pumpkin puree, or you can also roast pumpkin in the oven yourself and feed the peeled pumpkin flesh to your dog. There are also many pumpkin supplements and pumpkin dog treats for dogs to enjoy.



#### Raspberries

Yes, dogs can eat raspberries.
Raspberries are safe for dogs in moderation. They contain antioxidants that are great for dogs. They're low in sugar and calories, but high in fiber, manganese, and vitamin C. Raspberries are especially good for senior dogs because they have anti-inflammatory properties, which can help aging joints. However, they do contain small, naturally occurring amounts of xylitol, so limit your dog to no more than eight

ounces of fresh or frozen raspberries at any one time. Or, just choose a dog treat that includes raspberry as an ingredient.



#### **Strawberries**

Yes, dogs can eat strawberries.
Strawberries are full of fiber and vitamin C. Along with that, they also contain an enzyme that can help whiten your dog's teeth as he or she eats them. Like all fruits, strawberries contain natural sugar, so offer them in moderation. Frozen strawberries can be a fun enrichment treat for dogs. (Or you could just eat the strawberries yourself and hide your dog's favorite training treat in this cute strawberry-shaped snuffle mat instead!)



#### Tomatoes

No, dogs should avoid tomatoes. While the ripened flesh of the tomato fruit is generally safe for dogs, the green parts of the tomato plant contain a toxic substance called solanine. A dog would need to eat a large amount of the tomato plant to make him or her sick, but it's better to skip tomatoes all together just to be safe. If your dog likes to explore your vegetable garden, be sure to prevent them from having access to your tomato plants. You can find dog-safe tomato treats if your dog loves the flavor or ripe, antioxidantrich tomatoes.



#### Watermelon

**Yes**, dogs can eat watermelon. It's important to remove the rind and seeds first, as they can cause intestinal blockage, but watermelon flesh is otherwise safe for dogs. It's full of vitamin A, B-6, and C, as well as potassium. Watermelon is 92 percent water, so it's a great way to help keep your dog hydrated on hot summer days. Freeze chunks of seeded watermelon for a fun hot-weather enrichment treat for your dog. (You can even find watermelon-flavored dog treats!)

#### **Vegetables Dogs Can and Can't Eat**



No, dogs should not eat asparagus. While asparagus isn't necessarily unsafe for dogs, there's really no benefit to feeding it to them. It's too tough to be eaten raw, and by the time you cook it down so it's soft enough for dogs to eat, asparagus loses much of its nutritional value. If you really want to share a veggie with your dog, there are plenty of other options that would be a better choice. But, if your dog really loves asparagus for some reason, it won't harm them to eat it.



#### Broccoli

Yes, broccoli is safe for dogs to eat in small amounts, and is best served as an occasional treat. It is high in fiber and vitamin C and low in fat. However, broccoli florets contain isothiocyanates, which can cause mild-to-potentially-severe gastric irritation in some dogs. Tough broccoli stalks have been known to cause obstruction in the esophagus in dogs. So, if your dog likes broccoli, it's better to offer them cooked broccoli to help avoid these issues. (Or, let them gnaw on a broccoli-shaped dog chew toy while you dig in to your beef & broccoli takeout.)



#### Brussels Sprouts

Yes, dogs can eat Brussels sprouts. Brussels sprouts are loaded with nutrients and antioxidants that are great for humans and dogs, alike. Don't overfeed them to your dog, however, because they can cause lots and lots of gas. Cabbage is also safe for dogs—since Brussels sprouts are basically tiny cabbages—but sharing cabbage with your dog comes with the same flatulence flag. Don't say we didn't warn you! If your dog is a big fan of Brussels sprouts or cabbage, and you're cool with the results, you might want to consider some dehydrated dog foods that include these leafy greens as a component.



Yes, dogs can eat carrots. Carrots are an excellent low-calorie snack that is high in fiber and beta-carotene, which produces vitamin A. Plus, crunching on this orange root vegetable is great for your dog's teeth. Carrots are included as an ingredient in many dog foods as well as plenty of carrot dog treats.



**Yes**, celery is safe for dogs to eat. In addition to vitamins A, B, and C, this crunchy green snack contains the nutrients needed to promote a healthy heart and possibly fight cancer. As if that wasn't enough, celery is also known to freshen doggy breath. Find celery dog chews for an option any dog would enjoy.



Yes, dogs can eat green beans. Chopped, steamed, raw, or canned – all types of green beans are safe for dogs to eat, as long as they are plain. Green beans are full of important vitamins and minerals and they're also full of fiber and low in calories. Opt for no-salt canned green beans for dogs for adding to food, or frozen green beans can be fun enrichment snacks.



#### Mushrooms

No, dogs should avoid mushrooms. Wild mushrooms can be toxic for dogs. While only 50-100 of the 50,000 mushroom species worldwide are known to be toxic, the ones that are poisonous can really hurt your dog or even lead to death. While wild mushrooms are always a solid no, washed mushrooms purchased from the supermarket for human consumption are generally fine for dogs.



#### Onions

No, dogs should never eat onions. If you think your dog has eaten onions, call your veterinarian. Onions, leeks, and chives are part of a family of plants called Allium that is poisonous to most pets, and especially cats. Eating onions can cause your dog's red blood cells to rupture, and can also cause vomiting, diarrhea, stomach pain, and nausea. Poisoning from onions is more serious in Japanese breeds of dogs like Akitas and Shiba Inus, but all dogs are very susceptible to it. If you have children in your household, be sure they aren't sharing foods with onions with your

dog, and secure your onion food scraps or leftovers where your dog cannot access them.



#### Peas

Yes, dogs can eat peas. Green peas, snow peas, sugar snap peas, and garden or English peas are all OK for dogs to find in their bowl on occasion. Peas have several vitamins, minerals, and are rich in protein and high in fiber. You can feed your dog fresh or frozen peas, but avoid canned peas with added sodium.



#### **Spinach**

Yes, dogs can eat spinach, but it's not one of the top vegetables you'll want to be sharing with you pup. Spinach is high in oxalic acid, which blocks the body's ability to absorb calcium and can lead to kidney damage. While your dog would probably have to eat a very large amount of spinach to have this problem, it might be best to go with another vegetable. If you want to give your dog the benefits of the leafy green, you can find spinach dog treats for an occasional snack.




